NEW JERSEY STATE LEGISLATURE

The New Jersey Legislature consists of two Houses: a 40-member Senate and an 80-member General Assembly. The legislature's main job is to enact laws. The Legislature can also propose amendments to the New Jersey Constitution. Both the senate and the general assembly introduce and vote on bills.

NEW JERSEY STATE SENATE — All forty (40) State Senate districts are up for election. The senate is responsible for approving the Governor's appointments of judges and other officials and institutes and conducts impeachment proceedings against State officials as well as reviews administrative rules and regulations.

NEW JERSEY GENERAL ASSEMBLY — All eighty (80) seats of the General Assembly are up for election. The General Assembly can bring impeachment charges and all bills requiring revenue to be raised start in the assembly.

SCHOOL BOARDS

The New Jersey public school system operates with districts governed by locally elected school boards. School Boards craft, review, and implement district policies, approve and oversee budgets, oversee and manage the superintendent, and serve as the final authority of the district.

COUNTY GOVERNMENTS

New Jersey is divided into 21 counties with each having its own board of freeholders as the county council. Freeholders are the legislative branch of county government. They make laws, vote on resolutions, approve or reject the spending, budget and other proposals of the executive branch or the county executive.

MUNICIPAL GOVERNMENT

All 564 municipalities in New Jersey, regardless of their type (i.e., borough, township, city, town, or village), are more layered and complex than most other states. Every aspect of living is governed and impacted by the elected officials seated in local municipalities.
